Dear All,

Greetings from Samarth !

The year 2019-20 went off quietly with only a couple of small projects. We had a new collaborator this year. We were surprised to receive a mail from a Assistant Professor at the department of Global Health, Heidelberg University to assist his team for a study on hypertension to be carried out in Chennai. We were happy to know that he was impressed with our work by reading on our website and wanted Samarth to carry out the qualitative interviews for the study.. It was an interesting study and the research team at Chennai along with the team from Heidelberg visited the different zones in Chennai to recruit participants for the interviews. The study is completed and the analysis is ongoing by the team at Heidelberg University. We look forward to the study findings and participating in manuscript writing for journals.

The other collaborative study was with Psychiatrist who was interested to explore and understand perceptions of different stakeholders on Autism Spectrum disorders (ASD) and their challenges in identification, diagnosis and barriers to early intervention. We are in the process of carrying out interviews and focus group discussions with parents and different categories of health care providers.

We find that Samarth is being approached by scientists and researchers with different specialties. Hypertension and ASD are new areas for us at Samarth! However, our skills are in methods of quantitative and qualitative research and we so we are always open and excited to learn and expand our knowledge. We are glad that we could be involved in such new areas of research topics.

One of the disappointing news we received this year was that our proposal on intervention for depression among pregnant women which we submitted to National Institute of Health (NIH) was not funded. We have now revised the proposal and submitted to UKRI-MRC (United Kingdom Research and Innovation – Medical Research Council). We are keeping our fingers crossed!

This year we also made a major decision to disband our institutional review board (IRB). The reason for this due to ICMR's new guidelines that requires review board's of institutions' to meet mandatorily every 3 months. Samarth is a small organization with not more than four or five research studies in a year and it was not possible for us to schedule meetings every three months. So we made the hard decision of disbanding Samarth's IRB. We also entered a memorandum of agreement with Schizophrenia Research Foundation who have kindly consented to review our research proposals in their IRB. I thank Dr. Padmavathy, Director, SCARF for this kind gesture. My profound appreciation for all the distinguished members who served on our IRB and thank them for their valued contribution while they served on the board.

Our yearly workshops are well received and we find that the number of individuals who want to register is increasing every year. The department of Social work, University of Texas wants to have training on research methods every year from now on and we carried out the training for the second batch of students this year.

Thanks to all our governing body & advisory board members and our auditors for your continued support and guidance.

RESEARCH AND TRAINING ACTIVITIES

ONGOING RESEARCH PROJECTS

1. Beliefs and norms around hypertension and aging in Chennai, India (July 2019 to December 2019)

Dr. Nikkil Sudharsanan Ph.D, MPH, Asst. Prof. Global Health, Heidelberg University Germany, contacted Samarth to assist with a study that aimed to understand the beliefs and norms around hypertension in Chennai city. While the morbidity and mortality risks of non communicable diseases (NCD) like Hypertension, can be reduced substantially through careful disease management, India has very large gaps in successful disease management. Theories from behavioural science offer several potential reasons for why levels of disease management are so low; however, a dearth of research examining which behavioural-scientific explanations for NCD decision making are relevant in a context like India, may potentially explain why levels of disease management are so low even among individuals with access to and the ability to pay for care. The primary aim of this study is to better understand NCD-related decision making among middle-class adults in Chennai, India, focusing on hypertension in particular. This mixed methods study is funded by the Heidelberg Institute of Global Health, Germany. The qualitative component of the study which involves conducting interviews with a sample of participants is being undertaken by Samarth in select areas in the city of Chennai. A total of 50 interviews are planned to be carried out. Samarth will be responsible for carrying out the qualitative interviews, transcribing and translating those in Tamil into English and submitting these to Dr. Nikhil's team

2. Barriers to Early Identification of Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) (September 2019 to August 2020)

In collaboration with Dr. Kannan, a consultant psychiatrist in Chennai, a small qualitative study is being undertaken by Samarth to understand the perspectives of paediatricians, psychiatrists, parents and therapists (occupational therapist and speech & language therapist) on barriers to early identification of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). This condition is characterized by poor social communication, repetitive behaviour or stereotypes and sensory issues. It occurs in all racial, ethnic and socio-economic groups but more frequently in boys (4:1) than girls. Over the last few decades there has been an enormous increase in the prevalence of autism. The Center for Disease Control (CDC) data shows that 1 in 59 children may be suffering from ASD (CDC 2016). Untreated it causes severe impairment in the child leading to enormous burden to the families of these children. A consensus statement from the Indian Academy of Paediatrics has recommended that intervention should begin as early as possible. The study also seeks to obtain perceptions from paediatricians, parents and therapists on potential strategies to overcome these barriers. Using a combination of Focus group discussions (FGDs) and in-depth interviews (IDIs), we are in the process of collecting data from health care providers (HCPs) like paediatricians, psychiatrists and therapists involved in the care of children with autism and from parents of children who have been diagnosed with autism. This one year study will be carried out in Chennai.

PROJECT IN PIPELINE

- 1. Intervening with Pregnant Women in Depression in South India. A Collaborative Project with Dr. Deepa Rao, Department of Global Health & Department of Psychiatry, University of Washington, USA. Submitted to NIH as an R01-Submission deadline October 2019**

Suicide rates among Indian women are amongst the highest in the world and depressive symptoms have been linked to high rates of preterm births in India. Despite clear linkages between maternal depressive symptoms and negative consequences for birth outcomes, no published studies have examined the effectiveness of intervening on depressive symptoms experienced by pregnant women in India. The proposed intervention targets pregnant women in South India who have mild to moderate depressive symptoms and combines Motivational Interviewing (MI) and Interpersonal Counseling (IPC: a brief form of Interpersonal Therapy), using materials already adapted for the Indian context. We aim to determine the effectiveness of the combined intervention and identify mechanisms involved in reducing maternal depression in Karnataka and Tamil Nadu, India. We will also train research staff and junior investigators in conducting mental health intervention research through intensive mentorship of pilot projects and coursework. Our project will benefit from our long-standing collaborations with investigators in India and the United States. We expect that this study will demonstrate the effectiveness of the intervention in reducing rates of depressive symptoms in pregnant women and an improved understanding of mechanisms involved in achieving these outcomes. Furthermore, we will gather information on the intervention's impact on 12-month maternal depression, birth outcomes, and growth indicators. This proposal had been submitted as an RO1 grant to NIH but unfortunately was not funded, We therefore revised it based on comments received and submitted it in response to a call for application received from UKRI-MRC (United Kingdom Research and Innovation – Medical Research Council). The results will be known in October 2020.

- 2. Strengthening Family Relationships in India: A Community Based Intervention for Men.” NIH R21 This study was not approved for funding**

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
